City Cousin, Country Cousin

Many years ago, I followed an ongoing discussion in the letters section of an environmental newsletter about which benefitted the environment most, country living or city living. Proponents of cities would argue for a more centralized distribution of goods and services as well as a smaller footprint, per person, for living space due to apartment houses, condos and smaller acreage for homes. Those who preferred the country countered by saving fewer people made for healthier air quality, reduced the number of cars an the road, and engendered a more relaxed and comfortable lifestyle for country folk.

Another line of argument had to do with the distances people had to travel to get to work. Many people who worked in the city but lived in rural outlying areas had to commute long distances, using up fuel. People who lived in the city generally worked there as well and also had a mass transit system they could utilize. On the other hand, those living far from their jobs usually drove a short distance to a parking lot and boarded a commuter train.

There were numerous other examples by both sides of the argument that I can no longer recall, but I do remember

Congratulations to all of the volunteers who

were recently recognized for their outstanding contributions to Mission Trails Regional Park. It was a pleasure to participate in the Mission Trails Regional Park Awards Ceremony and help celebrate their achievements. I especially want to honor Myrna Bateman who received the Volunteer of the Year award.

A cause for celebration is the completion of the Old Mission Dam Dredging Project. In order to protect the integrity of the historic dam, 750 cubic vards of silt that had built up behind the dam were removed. Now the water flows as it should with out impediment. It was a time consuming project and required the City of San Diego to obtain numerous permits from the City's Development Services Department, the California Department of Fish and Game, Regional Water Quality Control Board and the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers. Many people were involved and saw this project through to completion. One of them was Michelle Abella-Shon who was project manager for the City of San Diego, and I want to publicly thank her for doing an outstanding job.

Other news to tell you about is the unnamed and unofficial street that serves as the entrance to the Equestrian (Multiuse) Staging Area. That will soon change. I'm guiding the City's efforts to officially designate that street as Equestrian Circle and have street signs installed. Stay tuned for more details.

the discussions being quite heated. What I also remember is what was occurring around me at the time. I was living in a farmhouse apartment located on a "farm" raising beefalo. It was quite a bucolic place and I loved living there. But, this was during a period when it was suddenly fashionable to eschew city life to go live in the country where it was safe and quiet, away from the hustle and bustle of the urban environment. Thousands of acreage of farmland was being "developed" into housing tracts of four or five acres. Eventually, even the farm where I was living was sold and developed. Families moved in to experience the good, healthy life.

What happened next was, I guess, to be expected. This mad rush to the country created this vacuum, which sucked with it much of what these people were running from. Malls both large and small started encroaching onto more and more of the landscape. One major four lane road once controlled by the occasional traffic light grew to

six lanes dominated by numerous traffic lights and overpasses. Needless to say, the mom and pop gas stations and businesses that lined the roadway had to go. Although many new roads were cut through pristine woodlands to connect growing communities, others were blocked by conservation laws and activists. Many country roads, that are major arteries, were kept from being widened due to strong protest from residents, but traffic on these roads inch along during rush hour.

The arguments for the environmental benefits of living in the city and the encroachment of urbanity into the country had a profound effect on my way of thinking. Having lived in the country most of my life, this country boy decided to move to the big city. I concluded that what we should be doing, as "Nature Lovers", was not to live in the country and encourage the spreading of asphalt and shopping, but to live in the city and encourage the spreading of gardens, parkland and open space. Make the city a place in which the country cousin would feel comfortable.





1985 Mission Trails Regional Park Master Development Plan to be Updated.

The Mission Trails Regional Park Citizens' Advisory Committee (CAC) and Task Force are in the process of reviewing and making recommendations to update the 1985 Mission Trails Regional Park Master Development Plan. The text of the 1985 Plan, along with recommended changes, can be found on the Mission Trails Regional Park web site at www.mtrp.org/master_plan.

The CAC has reviewed and given conceptual approval to the Lake Murray, Cowles Mountain, Mission Gorge and Fortuna Mountain sections. These sections will be considered by the Task Force at the May $21^{\rm st}$ meeting.

The Introduction, Planning and Implementation sections will be presented at the May 6th CAC meeting with a recommendation that Planning and Implementation be combined into one section. It is anticipated that recommended changes to the Overall Master
