NEW EXHIBITS REVITALIZE THE INTERPRETIVE CENTER

The Mission Trails Regional Park Visitor & Interpretive Center is one of the finest facilities of its kind. It has received the City of San Diego 1995 William Earl Hayden Award for Building Project of the Year and The American Society of Landscape Architects Centennial Medallion that recognizes the Visitor Center site as a National Landmark for Outstanding Landscape Architecture. People from all over the world have visited and commented on its beauty, splendor and accessibility. commanding view of the San Diego River, outdoor interpretive plant walk, comfortable library, large theater for viewing the two informative videos and inspirational slide show, and its well planned interpretive features, the Visitor Center is a great place to begin or end a hike or simply a quiet place to spend a few hours. The staff and volunteers of the park are continually upgrading and adding to the comprehensive educational components at the Center. In this respect the interpretive elements have undergone some significant changes and improvements.

Recently installed is the Seismometer; one of the few in the county that is accessible by the general public. Two monitors display real time seismic activity at various locations throughout San Diego County, including Mission Trails. The seismometer is so sensitive it will record the stamping of feet; so, bring your friends and family and record your own earthquake.

Another new exhibit displays numerous minerals, rocks and fossils found in the park. A large

sample of petrified wood was recently found and will soon be on display in the exhibit.

Another recently installed exhibit consists of information on bird and bat houses. It was put together by volunteer Gordon Patty who is the spearhead of our bird and bat house project in Mission Trails.

While here take some time to study the beautiful new, twenty-six foot long, mural created by Cynthia Hight and David Gomez. It depicts the Mission Dam, as it appears today, as well as numerous animal and plant species found in the park. See how many you can find.

Future projects will include an improved exhibit focusing on the history and culture of the Kumeyaay people. Other displays will be centered on the Earth Sciences; some will depict mounted specimens of birds found in the park; and a few will be hands on exhibits to entertain and educate the children.

The Mission Trails Regional Park & Interpretive Center is located at One Father Junipero Serra Trail off of Mission Gorge Road one hundred yards east of the Jackson Drive intersection. For a map and more detailed directions visit www.mtrp.org. Admission to the Center is free and it is open every day from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. except New Year's, Thanksgiving and Christmas. The Center is a great way to spend a quiet and inexpensive day alone or with family and friends. Also, bring along some sturdy shoes to spend some time outdoors.



A Message From Councilmember Jim Madaffer

On the banks of the San Diego River, Governor Gray Davis recently signed into law legislation that will have a tremendous and long-lasting impact on San Diego. Assemblymember Christine Kehoe watched as the Governor signed AB 2156 - her measure to establish the San Diego River Conservancy. Mayor Dick Murphy, Councilmember Donna Frye, Councilmember Toni Atkins, San Diego County Planning Commissioner Michael Beck and I were there for this great moment.

All of us share the goal of restoring and preserving the San Diego River as it flows 52 miles from Julian to Ocean Beach where it empties into the Pacific Ocean. Many people are working to accomplish this. The formation of the Conservancy enables us to have a framework to accomplish this goal. A conservancy also qualifies us to receive state funds. It will take time. Most likely the results will not be seen right away but the impact this will have on the future is tremendous.

The Governor announced that \$12 million will be provided as seed money for restoring the San Diego River. These funds can be used for clean water projects, habitat restoration, recreational development and land acquisitions. The San Diego River now becomes a priority and our long awaited goal will be one step closer to reality.

The San Diego River runs though Mission Trails Regional Park. Think what the possibilities will be for MTRP as well as the San Diego area! Thanks to the efforts of many who are working on behalf of the San Diego River; one day this river will be the prominent centerpiece it deserves to be.

Other Projects

Another big project was the grading of the Cowles Mountain Service Road. A big thanks to SDG&E: Don Nottingham & Bob McDonald for the great filling and grading of erosion ruts on the road. Just a really nice favor from SDG&E to help us with a formidable project. Also, kudos to MTRP Ground Maintenance Workers, Tom Folk & Miguel Aguilar for their invaluable support on these projects. Couldn't do it without you guys....Thanks! By the way - the combined value of all the free labor and material for both the Deerfield BMX site, and Cowles Service Road exceeded over \$170,000.

Unfortunately, the recent "heat-wave" has slowed down a lot of our trail work. We have made the first cut of the Visitor Loop Connector Trail. It's ready to use, but we'll be doing a bunch more to finish it up. Ranger Mel Naidas is working with Scouts to provide fencing in this area to protect our rehabilitation efforts at the nearby Visitor Center former BMX site.

The rock climbing community did a big project on "Adopt A Crag" day, brushing-in volunteer trails, and repairing erosion controls built into the trail tread. Thanks to Dave Kennedy for coordinating this project, and Miguel Aguilar for covering my part while I was at the Trails Conference. Another thanks to Art Messier, for his help with some of the more technical problems on the Climb Trails.

San Diego Mountain Bike Association completed another big piece of trail repair on the North Suycott Trail fondly or locally know as E-Ticket. This was part of a nation-wide event "National Public Lands Day". Thanks to Everett Newman for putting this together and coordinating the mountain bike community. Thanks to all who continue to prove that the mountain bikers "are" good guys (and ladies...).

Finally, thanks to my steadfast trail volunteers. You know who you are. Hopefully, as the weather cools down, we can move forward on some projects that won't kill us. Let's hope for a good winter!

MISSION TRAILS HERBARIUM

Volunteers Wanted

Collecting plant samples in natural settings can be a very satisfying and educational pastime. Mission Trails Regional Park has recently started a herbarium, starting with grass species in



seed. The collection will consist of permanent physical specimens of plants that are found within the park, each identified by its name. Plant specimens will be pressed, dried, and mounted for, decades of preservation. It is planned that the public could eventually have access to the herbarium, as they do to a book library.



In-depth knowledge of plants is not required to volunteer for this project. Nature lovers committed to learning, following procedures and having fun are encouraged to take part. Each specimen selected for mounting will have the name of the individual collector next to it. 

KIDZWATCH

KIDZWATCH Program at Mission Trails is now in its third year at Mission Trails Regional Park. This program makes it possible for youth to enjoy recreational and educational nature-based experiences. Since the first KIDZWATCH Program took place in October 2000, twelve successful programs and outings have taken place, each offering information and instruction in outdoor safety, vegetation identification, wildlife appreciation and cultural history.

Each KIDZWATCH experience is unique, based on the dynamics of the group. All events begin with a slide show presentation illustrating the abundance of the park's natural beauty and highlighting its historical value. This is followed by time spent exploring the Visitor Center and its interactive exhibits, including the excavations of pre-historic fossils, the culture of the Kumeyaay Indians who lived in Mission Trails approximately 20,000 years, and the recently installed seismograph equipment that monitors earthquake activity throughout the southern part of the state. Next, the participants follow a trail guide into the park for a hike, where many of the youth come into contact with nature for the very first time. The sights and sounds of the city are replaced with the sounds and sights of the natural world. Along the way, the trail guide points out the cultural and historical relevance of what the participants see, engaging them in the learning process with specifically tailored questions and answers so that they can fully appreciate all that they are experiencing.

Approximately 1100 children who are KIDZWATCH "graduates" and 550 parents have learned from park rangers and trail guides who come from Mission Trails, Balboa Park and Tri-Canyon. The park rangers and trail guides responsible for the KIDZWATCH Program serve as positive role models in the hope that all participants will become stewards of the park -- as kids, as teens, as adults and as seniors.

KIDZWATCH invites youth of all ages, abilities and income levels, from all parts of the city, to come and explore the park through the program, so that they can learn about nature awareness and appreciation, and join in a committed effort to promote long lasting, positive and supportive relationships with nature.

Winter Solstice Hikes on Cowles Mountain

Time: 6:00 a.m. on Friday, December 20, through Sunday, December 22, 2002.

Starting Point: Trailhead adjacent to the parking lot at Golfcrest Dr. & Navajo Rd.

Description: The Mission Trails Regional Park Trail Guides will lead pre-dawn hikes to the area of the solstice observatory on Cowles Mountain on the 20th and 22nd of December. The Canyoneers of the San Diego Natural History Museum will lead the hike on Saturday the 21st. The solstice site is approximately one mile up the trail. The age of the site is unknown. It is known that the Kumeyaay used similar sites in Southern California. For all three hikes, we hope to see the rising sun split by a peak on the eastern horizon. The ascent will be in the dark. Good shoes and a flashlight are recommended. These hikes continue to be among the most popular events in the park. A word of caution for anyone joining the hikes or hiking on their own: there is danger of eye damage if you stare directly at the sun. You can observe the sunrise safely for a very few seconds through narrow slits (such as between your fingers held together) or smoked glass. Plan on a two-hour hike.



MTRP Trail Guide Training **Begins in January 2003**

Trail Guides are MTRP volunteers trained to lead interpretive nature walks in the park. Each year, MTRP conducts a training program for people interested in learning about the natural and cultural history of the park and sharing that knowledge with the public. The curriculum covers ecology, botany, geology, history, birds, mammals, reptiles, insects, and Kumeyaay culture. This 10-week program involves a three-hour classroom session every Wednesday evening and a three-hour field activity on Saturday mornings. At the end, students take a written exam on the material and demonstrate their interpretation skills by taking a veteran trail guide on a sample walk. Trail Guide graduates are expected to lead at least one walk per month.
