PARK RESTORATION

DONATIONS RECEIVED

The Board of Directors of the Mission Trails Regional Park Foundation and the City of San Diego Park and Recreation Department thank those who have contributed to Foundation and City funds established to help pay for the estimated \$250,000 damage caused by the October Cedar Fire. Funds are being used for erosion control, fence and sign replacement, and to repair damage to the foot bridge at the Tierrasanta entrance and to the Old Mission Dam. Mission Trails Regional Park Foundation received a \$15,000 donation from The San Diego Foundation After-the-Fire Fund. The City of San Diego Park and Recreation Department received a \$40,000 donation from Pardee Homes to be used to replace fencing in the park.

Thanks to all who have made personal donations to the Foundation to cover some of the costs associated with restoration of the burned areas of the park. These funds are being used for equipment and materials. Anyone wishing to make a donation can use the donor form on the back of this newsletter and write After-the-Fire fund on the donor form.

The Board of Directors of the Mission Trails Regional Park Foundation and park staff thank those who have contributed their time and energy toward preparing the park for visitor use in the aftermath of the Cedar Fire. Groups such as the CCC and Scouts, as well as numerous individuals from all walks of life, responded to our request for help. These tireless volunteers, along with the much needed funds donated, have helped park staff clear trails of debris, replace fencing and signage, and provide erosion control. Due to these efforts, park staff has been able to re-open the Suycott Wash, Fortuna Mountains and Grasslands areas of the park much earlier than expected.





A Message From Councilmember Jim Madaffer

Mission Trails Regional Park is beginning to recover from fire damage. What nature has begun a local company and organization are helping along. Pardee Homes and the Weyerhaeuser Company Foundation are helping with the restoration. I commend them for donating \$40,000 to the City of San Diego Park and Recreation Dept. for use in Mission Trails Regional Park. The donation was made at the January 27, 2004 San Diego City Council meeting. Beth Fischer, Vice President of Community Development for Pardee Homes said the company recognizes the immense value of our parks and community open space areas and that the contribution will be used to repair fencing, signage and other park facilities. It was a pleasure working with Pardee Homes in making arrangements for the donation.

More help is on the way. The San Diego Foundation's After the Fire Fund contributed \$15,000 to the Mission Trails Regional Park Foundation. These funds will be used as needed to repair damage to the park. Pardee Homes, The San Diego Foundation and individuals who have made contributions all deserve a big thank you for their help. Generous donations such as this will help us complete critical repairs so that the entire park can be reopened in the future.

How Bright is That Star? By George Varga

The brightness of a star is a measure of the amount of light that our eyes perceive and is called apparent magnitude or magnitude for short. The magnitude of a star is not an indication of its size or for that matter its distance from the Earth. A candle that is close to you in the dark can appear brighter than a car headlight a mile away, even though the candle is smaller.

The magnitude scale is a numerical scale in which the larger the number the dimmer the star. The numerical scale was developed by the Greek Astronomer Hipparchus (160 - 127 BC). He divided celestial objects into six classes calling the brightest ones class one or first magnitude. The next brightest group were classified 2nd magnitude, then 3rd magnitude until the dimmest stars that he could see were classified as 6th magnitude. It was not

until the advent of the telescope early in the 17th Century that people became aware of the fact that stars fainter than 6th magnitude could be seen.

On the magnitude scale the difference in brightness from one magnitude to another is a factor of 2.512. Consequently a 1st magnitude star is about 2.5 times brighter than a star of 2nd magnitude. A 1st magnitude star is therefore about 100 times brighter that a 6th magnitude star (2.512 x 2.512 x 2.512 x 2.512 x 2.512 or 2.5125).

There are two problems with the system as developed by Hipparchus. One is the fact that there are indeed stars that are dimmer than the human eye could see while the other is the fact that Hipparchus lumped the Sun, the Moon as well as bright planets like Jupiter and Venus as 1st magnitude stars. Over the course of time since the days of Gallileo (1564 - 1642), who is reputed to be the first to see the four main moons of Jupiter, astronomers have reworked the magnitude system that resulted in using negative as well as positive numbers. The magnitude factor of 2.512 was retained.

Under the new system the Sun, being the brightest celestial object, has a magnitude of about -26.7 while the faintest stars seen with the largest telescopes have a magnitude of about +25. This is a difference of 51.7 in magnitude making the Sun 480,000,000,000,000,000,000 times brighter than the dimmest star.

The magnitude of a star today is measured by photometers. However, one can estimate stellar brightness by comparing an unknown star brightness with that of a known one.

Here is a list of some objects and their magnitude:

Sun -26.7 Moon -12.7 Venus -4.0



Stargazing in the Park

Mission Trails Regional Park has two events per month where visitors may view the heavens through high powered telescopes. The first is led by our resident amateur astronomer George Varga (see article at left) and the other is sponsored and led by the San Diego Astronomy Association. Both are held at the day use parking lot at the Kumeyaay Lake Campground. On any given night, depending on time of year and weather conditions, one may see celestial objects as varied as planets and other astronomical moons, phenomena. Because many animals come out at night, you may even hear the howl of coyote or see the aerial feats of owls and bats, as well as the nocturnal activities of other critters. These events are free and all ages are welcome. Make sure you dress warmly and bring plenty of mosquito repellant. You are welcome to bring along a telescope if you have one. Events are canceled if skies are overcast.

IMPORTANT PUBLIC NOTICE ABOUT WILDLIFE IN THE PARK

Due to the recent fire, top-end predators such as mountian lion, bobcat and coyote may be observed in the park more often. Do your part to protect yourself and your pets by following these safety guidelines.



Don't hike alone and always be aware of your surroundings.

Keep children close to you at all times. Keep pets on a leash and stay on trails. Never approach or feed wildlife.

If you encounter a mountain lion.

Never run, crouch, bend over or turn your back. Do what you can to appear larger. Speak loudly and firmly and wave your arms slowly.

Fight back if attacked.


