# New Equestrian Staging Area Near Completion in Mission Trails Regional Park

The new 12-acre multi-use staging area in the East Fortuna Region of Mission Trails is nearing completion. This facility will provide improved access to trails along with multi-use parking facilities and picnic areas for hikers, bikers and equestrians. It is anticipated this new staging area will be open to the public with a festive grand opening event by the end of 2004, marking a major milestone for the park since the devastating Cedar Fire.

The Mission Trails Regional Park Foundation wishes to acknowledge Senator Dede Alpert's efforts to fund this project resulting in a \$1 million State of California grant in 2001. This project has also been made possible by a donation of approximately 7 acres of land from Allied Waste Industries.

But your help and support is still needed! Mission Trails Regional Park Foundation has a continuing need for funds for picnic tables, horse corrals and the multi-purpose and pony ride rings.

Opportunities to support this exciting project include the following:

- Sponsorships of new picnic tables entitles the donor to a name recognition plaque on the table for a \$3,000 donation
- Sponsorships are available at \$1,000 for each of the eight horse corrals (10'x10')
- A large multi-purpose ring (100' x 150') and smaller pony ride ring (50' x 100') are also in need of funds

All donors of \$1,000 or more are recognized on the donor recognition board at the Visitor and Interpretive Center as well as on the Mission Trails web site (www.mtrp.org) and in the Mission Trails newsletter.

The second phase of the project for future construction upon funding, will include a building with space for park staff offices and park maintenance facilities as well as an information area, restroom, large covered picnic area, and small kitchen to be available on a rental basis for public use. A smaller maintenance building with restrooms and an area for collecting money for periodic horse and pony ride rentals is also planned.

# A Message From Councilmember Jim Madaffer

Things are never at a standstill at Mission Trails Regional Park. I'm pleased to tell you about some of the activities taking place. We're planning a joyful – and I do mean joyful as in "at last" --- celebration later this year for the East Fortuna Staging Area, which can accommodate equestrian use, off of Highway 52 at Mast Boulevard. In fact, we just selected the name for that street – Mission Trails Equestrian Circle. Construction began earlier this year for the first phase of the project that includes parking areas and landscaping. When the first phase is completed in the fall, it will provide a 48-space parking lot, 15 parking spaces for vehicles with horse trailers and picnic areas. There will also be space for horse rentals and pony rides.

The park now has another automated external defibrillator or AED. As you know, AEDs are portable devices about the size of a laptop computer and are used to restore the heartbeat of someone undergoing sudden cardiac arrest. They are simple to operate and designed for the public to use. Without an AED, a person has a 5 percent survival rate. With an AED, their survival rate skyrockets to 90 percent. A big thank you to Kaiser Permanente. Kaiser generously donated the new AED which was recently installed at Lake Murray. Kaiser Permanente deserves credit for recognizing the need for one at the lake since so many people enjoy that facility.

Congratulations to all the winners of the 12th Annual Photography Contest. The judges must have had a tough time deciding among all the talented entries submitted. The amateur photographers who participated were honored at a reception in June.

The park was the place to be on May 22nd when the annual Explore Mission Trails Day was held. Thousands took part in the daylong activities such as guided nature walks, crafts, music, story telling, mountain bike demonstrations and other attractions. I was pleased to join the MTRP Foundation and the City of San Diego in sponsoring this great event.

There is no way that MTRP could run so smoothly without the help of outstanding volunteers. Many of these individuals have donated their time and expertise for years. They are knowledgeable, reliable and wonderful. Certainly the City of San Diego and all who use the park are indebted to them. # **Recycling Helps Improve City Recreation Facilities**

Five City of San Diego recreation sites in the east San Diego area received a \$7,569 check from the City's Environmental Services Department (ESD) to help improve the facilities. The donation, presented May 3, 2004 at the Allied Gardens Recreation Center, represents one year of revenue generated from the sale of recyclable materials collected at the San Diego Park and Recreation locations.

Visitors deposited 214,226 pounds of recyclables! Collected were plastic and glass beverage containers along with aluminum cans, newspapers, cardboard, office paper, catalogs, magazines and mixed paper during the twelve month period at the Allied Gardens, San Carlos, Tierrasanta, and Colina Del Sol recreation centers and Mission Trails Regional Park. The facilities are among the 43 drop-off sites within the Park and Recreation system currently participating in ESD recycling programs.

Since 1992, the program has approximately 14,000 tons of recyclables from disposal at the Miramar Landfill and earned \$667,000 in revenue from the sale of recyclables. The donations have helped purchase items at the Park and Recreation facilities such as jerseys and trophies for youth leagues, gymnastics mats, tennis court nets, table tennis equipment, benches for basketball courts, brochures, and funded special events such as spring egg hunts and Halloween carnivals.
