# Dig out your hiking boots, put on a smile and take on our 5-Peak Challenge

Mission Trails Regional Park has the highest peak in the City of San Diego - Cowles Mountain (1592') - but, is also home to four other high peaks: North Fortuna (1291'), South Fortuna (1094'), Kwaay Paay (1194'), and Pyles Peak (1379'). By far, the most heavily used hiking trail in the Park is the main route (from the corner of Golfcrest Drive and Navajo Road) to the peak of Cowles Mountain. This extremely popular trail is frequented daily by hundreds of park guests; however, the significant foot traffic on this trail has created some on-going challenges for park staff, in regards to trail maintenance and relationships with park neighbors.

The large volume of hikers on the main Cowles Mountain trail could easily be accommodated if they were spread throughout the park. To address this issue, Mission Trails Rangers and the Mission Trails Foundation have created a new "5-Peak Challenge" program, to encourage hikers to explore all five main peaks in the park, while reducing overall foot traffic on the main Cowles Mountain trail.

To complete the "challenge," hikers must stop by the Visitor Center to show photos of themselves next to the signs on the summit of all five peaks, and receive an official certificate and pin to acknowledge their accomplishment. Photos of the first 100 hikers to complete the 5-Peak challenge will be posted on our website, and their name will be entered in a drawing for a chance to win a prize!

The 5-Peak Challenge program will be officially launched the morning of Saturday, November 7th, at the base of the Kwaay Paay summit trail, located off Father Junipero Serra Trail, just west of the Kumeyaay Lake Campground. # EL NINO- The "little boy" that can pack a punch

#### What is El Nino and what impacts does it have in California?

El Niño is not a storm, but a temporary change in the climate of the Pacific ocean, in the region around the equator. You can see its effects in both the ocean and atmosphere, generally in Northern Hemisphere winter. Typically, the ocean surface warms up by a few degrees celsius. At the same time, the place where hefty thunderstorms occur on the equator moves eastward. Although those might seem like small differences, it nevertheless can have big effects on the world's climate. El Nino events occur on average of every two to seven years.

Impacts in California range from coastal erosion, floods, mudslides and a change in marine life. In June 2015, thousands of reddish-orange tuna crabs washed ashore

on San Diego beaches. It was a rare event, but not the first. "The crabs were a warm water indicator, but we don't know whether they are exclusively in the area from the blob [a large mass of warm water sitting in the Pacific Ocean in North America], El Nino, or other favorable oceanographic conditions," said Lindsey Sala, a museum scientist who manages the pelagic invertebrates collection at UCSD Scripps Institution of Oceanography.

#### Are we having a mild or a strong El Nino?

Predictions have it that this year's El Nino is going to be "pretty strong". The strongest? Not sure yet. Dan Cayan, a climate researcher at USGS and Scripps Institution of Oceanography said, "No two El Nino's in the record books have been exactly alike. This El Nino looks really robust and its strong, but not with the extreme amplitude we saw in 1997."

To give you an outlook of what we can expect we can look at past records and only compare. For example, the threemonth, June-August average of sea surface temperatures is 1.22 Celsius above normal. This is the third-highest June-August value since records started in the 1950s, behind 1987 (1.36 Celsius) and 1997 (1.42 Celsius). The August average is 1.49 Celsius, second behind August 1997 (1.74 Celsius). In other words, get your sturdy rain boots and umbrellas out!

#### What impacts does it have at MTRP?

Here at Mission Trails Regional Park, we want you to have an enjoyable experience. We advise you to stay clear of any potential hazards for your safety. As mentioned, El Nino can bring floods, mudslides, and even rockslides. In 2010 the Old Mission Dam and Kumeyaay Lake Campground flooded. Kwaay Paay and Climbers Loop are areas at MTRP that burned last year. With hardly any vegetation to hold the soil in place, it can become a very dangerous area to be hiking. With the right factors (substantial rain and wind), this area can produce mud and rockslides in a split of a second.

That is why, after a good rain fall/storm, we would encourage you to stay home until dry conditions arrive. The Park Rangers at MTRP will out be looking for down or broken trees/limbs, flooded areas and mudslide/rockslides.

#### How to prepare for El Nino.

Register your phone with Alert San Diego (www.readysandiego.org). Check your flood risk with FEMA's Flood Map (www. msc.fema.gov). Pick up free sandbags to prevent flooding (www.sandiegocounty.gov). Prevent soil erosion on your property and learn how to stay safe during a flood (www.readysandiego.org). Call MTRP Visitor Center to check Park conditions or go to www.mtrp.org for the most updated information on the park.
